Never take it personally even if developments are put forward that will clearly adversely affect not only Broadstairs and St. Peter's but Thanet as a whole, our role is to take every opportunity to try and represent the heritage of our town.

Manston Airport (we still have not heard the results)

The concomitant deferral of the review the Local Plan

National Grid's potential application for a Development Consent Order to concrete over a large part of Minster Marshes (see our previous Newsletter- Nov 23, available on our website)

Planning legislation is not the easiest of subjects – ask any Planner – and it has become more and more complicated over the years. starring Liz Grand as Clementine Churchill



BROADSTAIRS, A Trip Down Memory Lane

In the spring of 1890, Broadstairs received international press coverage when road builders discovered a number of Roman burial sites, while cutting through the chalk on the 'Sea View Estate'.

Contractors found several graves, just 2 feet below the surface, containing human skeletons and pottery – and the archaeological discovery made the *New York Times*.

Twenty burials were found in Castle Avenue, just west of Stone Road, and it was assumed the dead had been buried hastily after a battle in the neighbourhood. Three vases, just a few inches high and found near the North Foreland Lighthouse, were still intact.

Broadstairs' population was around 5000 at the time, and it had become increasingly popular among 'artist, literary, and dramatic celebrities' as well as 'the better class gentry'.

In the next 20 years, the population of the town would double. The arrival of the railways made it easier and quicker to get to, while accommodation had become fancier too.

In 1890, the Grand Hotel above Louisa Bay, standing in 2 acres of grounds, had been redecorated and refurnished, with 100 bedrooms as well as dining, smoking and reading rooms. The hotel enticed visitors with Broadstairs' exceptionally pure air, 'open to the full breath of the German Ocean.'

For those with smaller budgets, the Seafield boarding house on Granville Road described itself as a select watering place highly recommended by London physicians. It was run by Mr and Mrs Pain.

According to the press, Broadstairs shunned the gaieties and frivolities of its more 'volatile' neighbours - Margate and Ramsgate – instead it was favoured by weary politicians and City gentlemen as a veritable haven of rest. And of course, it was loved by Charles Dickens who holidayed here between 1837 and 1859 and while here penned parts of many a famous novel. Indeed, such was his love of Broadstairs he wrote a pamphlet all about it entitled 'Our English Watering Place'.

There was plenty of entertainment on offer too, including the annual regatta. It had been held in Broadstairs since the mid 19th century, and in 1867 a circus manager pitched his tent in the midst of the festivities, then drove three camels and an elephant through the town.

Within a few years, the annual water sports day included races and fireworks. The weather could be temperamental, with events interrupted by rain and thunder. In 1886, just as the first race was about to begin, rain started falling in torrents and the organising committee decided to postpone the event. But no sooner had the announcement been made, the clouds rolled away, out came the sun, and the day continued.

In 1890, the regatta was held in September, a little later than usual, and the highlight was the Coastguards' race, in which Westgate came first and Broadstairs last!

The annual regatta was much loved and continued to develop over the years to become what we now call 'The Water Gala'.
